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

## Inside Municipal Budgeting

On June 23, City Council held a special meeting to adopt the city's 2009-2010 budget. By adopting the budget, Council will bring to an end a process that began last December. In North Carolina, fiscal years run July 1 to June 30, and local governments must adopt a balanced budget by July 1, according to the Budget and Fiscal Control Act. The city's budget consists of two major funds and four minor funds. The major funds are the General Fund and the Water and Sewer Fund. The General Fund accounts for resources not required to be accounted for in other specific funds. Typically, the General Fund includes services that are not enterprise (business-like) operations. This fund relies on tax dollars as the primary source of revenue. For 2009-2010, Clinton's General Fund budget is \$8.5 million, a \$740 thousand decrease from the previous year. Property taxes account for 30 percent of General Fund revenues, and sales tax represents 20 percent of revenues. Other various taxes and fees, along with intergovernmental funds, make up the other 50 percent of revenues. The Water and Sewer fund is an enterprise fund, meaning it operates like a business and must be self-supporting. Revenues in the Water and Sewer fund are generated through charges and fees associated with water and sewer usage. For 2009-2010, the Water and Sewer Fund budget is \$4.5 million.

The budget process begins in December with the Capital Improvement Program. This is a five-year plan that analyzes the effects of large capital costs on the city's operating budget and financial condition. Once approved by City Council, the first year of the plan becomes part of the operating budget. This process wraps up in mid-April. In January, department heads meet with their staff to put together departmental proposals. They submit their proposals to the Finance Officer and City Manager for review at the beginning of April. The Finance Officer works to establish accurate revenue projections, which she and the City Manager use to evaluate the departmental budgets and make recommendations based on City Council's goals and objectives. City staff and Council meet for budget workshops during May. At these workshops, Council members offer input regarding the budget and receive information from city staff. Once a proposed budget is constructed, City Council holds a public hearing at the beginning of June to receive citizen input on the recommended budget. After the public hearing, the City Manager makes the final revisions and City Council adopts a budget ordinance that

establishes what the city can spend for the fiscal year. To make changes to the budget throughout the year, City Council must approve budget amendments. Once adopted, the budget becomes even more important. It is a guide to direct department activities and services, a management tool to improve services, and a communication tool for citizens to see how their tax money provides services. 

## Saving Our Lives in Sampson County

From 2000-2005, alcohol-related traffic accidents accounted for 7.6 percent of all accidents in Sampson County. The state average is 5.5 percent. As a result, Sampson County was one of nineteen North Carolina counties chosen to participate in the Strategic Prevention Framework-State Incentive Grant (SPF-SIG) to reduce the number of alcohol-related traffic accidents. Police Chief Mike Brim explains the program as a "significant prevention effort aimed at saving lives and preventing injuries" and an "opportunity to make our community a safe place to live, work, and play." The Sampson County SPF-SIG program is called "Saving Our Lives In Sampson" or SOLIS. A Community Coordinator is responsible for bringing community stakeholders together, developing an action plan for the SOLIS program, and evaluating the program's success. The person shouldering such a responsibility is Maria Paniagua. Previously an attorney and environmental legislation consultant in Nicaragua, Maria has lived in Sampson County since 2004. Maria joined the Clinton Police Department in May to serve as the Community Coordinator for the SOLIS program. She says the program will seek to prevent alcohol-related problems by understanding the influence of alcohol during various stages of life. Maria says the goal is to reduce alcohol-impaired driving, injuries, and fatalities that will save lives and reduce morbidity in future generations.
