Clinton 2035 Comprehensive Plan Approved *by Mary Rose, Planning Director*

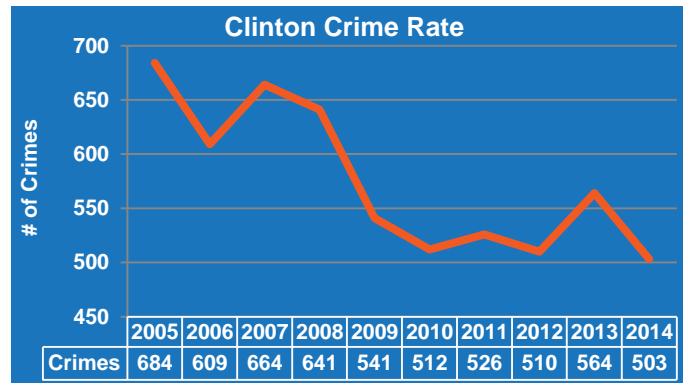


Clinton City Council formally adopted the Clinton 2035 Comprehensive Plan at their May 5, 2015 meeting. The comprehensive plan provides a creative and dynamic blueprint to guide long-term growth and development in Clinton through the next twenty (20) years. It establishes a foundation for the city’s ongoing planning efforts and serves as the city’s primary policy guide for short- and long-range planning, zoning, and land use decisions within the city-limits and extra-territorial jurisdiction. The plan also includes a community health component thanks to a partnership with the Sampson County Health Department. More than 600 citizens provided input for the plan through focus groups, surveys, public presentation, and the citizen steering committee. Dwight Horne, chair of the Clinton 2035 Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee commented, “Benjamin Franklin once noted, ‘If you fail to plan, you are planning to fail.’ Until this process,

I had never considered how much would go into the long-term planning for a city and the amount of work and variables that had to be considered.” Bill Scott, another Clinton 2035 Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee member, remarked, “I very much appreciated the opportunity to be involved in this process. I have gained a whole new respect for the time, energy, and resources that are involved in the planning process. Given the details we examined and considered, I’m convinced our plan puts Clinton and the surrounding communities in the best possible light and gives an on-going sense of direction that will be just as compelling for future generations to appreciate and enjoy.” The plan emphasizes issues facing smaller, rural North Carolina municipalities including development of various types of housing, community health, infrastructure and resource needs, and other quality of life issues. Clinton Crime Rates Decrease *by Jay Tilley, Police Chief*

The State Bureau of Investigation (SBI) through the Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) recently published the 2014 crime rate for the City of Clinton. From 2013 to 2014, the city’s crime rate dropped from 664 to 503. Over the past ten years, the crime rate has dropped 73%, with violent crimes cut almost in half since 2005. “I am very proud of the hard work put in by the men and women of the Clinton Police Department. Their dedication and the partnerships they have formed with citizens have led to a ten-year low in reported crime,” stated Captain Donald



Edwards. City of Clinton Police Officers receive an average of 120 hours of training each year, which far exceeds the 24 hours mandated by the State. The extra training, community involvement, directive patrols, and the efforts of the Neighborhood Improvement Team all contributed to the lowest crime rate in ten years. The Clinton Police Department will continue striving to provide a safe community.
