Maxine Harris is the current Mayor Pro-Tem for the City of Clinton, representing District 5 for the past decade. A Sampson County native, Ms. Harris has called Clinton home since she was two years old. Ms. Harris has always been dedicated to public service. After receiving her degree from NC A&T University, she returned home wanting to make a difference. She was integral in the integration of Sampson County Social Services during her career as a social worker. Committed to the idea “when you know better, you can do better,” Ms. Harris turned her attention to education, becoming a school counselor and later, an assistant principal. She applies that same philosophy to her role as a City Councilmember. Ms. Harris believes “there are a lot of great ideas out there” that the City needs to hear. “We exist for citizens,” comments Ms. Harris, “the City needs to be ‘user friendly’ and citizens need to feel comfortable with their city government and city employees.” Ms. Harris points to the annual district meetings held by the City as great opportunities to listen to and learn from citizens. She encourages all Clinton residents to participate in their city government and attend their district meetings to share their ideas.

City Sets Dates for Annual District Meetings

Do you have a great idea for the City? What are your expectations of city services? City officials want to know what you think. “The annual district meetings provide a great opportunity for citizens, who do not typically come to monthly council meetings, to express their concerns and provide us with feedback,” says City Manager John Connet. “We are looking for ways to build partnerships and address citizen concerns,” adds Connet. This is also an opportunity for citizens to speak directly to their council representative. Council members encourage citizens to come and offer ideas and express concerns. Councilman Steve Stefanovich says, “Our goal is to open the lines of communication between citizens and City Hall. These district meetings are just one tool to accomplish this goal.” Of particular note is the District 5 meeting on February 26. The City recently purchased property on Barden Street across from the Sampson Center. The City is seeking input from the neighborhood for the best way to develop the property to meet the area’s needs. The district meetings will be held in February and March at locations convenient to each district. Fall Clean Up Helps Keep Clinton Beautiful

From October 13th to 17th, Clinton Public Works employees worked diligently to pickup yard debris, tires, metal scraps, and other debris not normally collected. The result was 83 tons of extra materials including 3.24 tons of old tires and 4.62 tons of scrap metal for recycling. “We put in a lot of time and effort during Fall Clean Up,” says Streets and Sanitation Manager Tony Steffen, “I think this is a great program to help keep our city beautiful.” Currently, the City only collects solid waste materials, but Mr. Steffen hopes to further the program by safely collecting materials such as paints and household chemicals in the future. The City will schedule a second clean up week during the spring.

Clinton Recognized by North Carolina Main Street Center



The committee recognized how well the City worked with private owners to help restore an important piece of our downtown." The award application tells the story of Kaleel's City Grill, a popular downtown venue that burned in June 2005. In August 2005, the City hired a structural engineer to stabilize and save the front exterior wall. As a key property on the courthouse square that had been "the place" for lunch downtown, the City realized it needed to take action. City Council approved the purchase of the building in 2006 with the hopes that by repairing the building it would once again become a downtown mainstay. Mr. Carr purchased the building in November of 2007 and immediately began reconstructing the building. After consultation with the City, and realizing the long history of the Kaleel's property as a restaurant, Mr. Carr continued his reconstruction with a restaurant in mind. In January 2008, Mr. Carr leased the property to Ronald and Nathan Gooden who opened the Clinton City Grill in May of 2008. "We are very proud of this award," comments Mayor Lew Starling, "It shows the commitment of the City to maintaining our downtown, and it exemplifies how well our community works together."

The North Carolina Main Street Center works to help communities stimulate economic development with a comprehensive approach to downtown revitalization. Each year the Main Street Center presents awards to recognize accomplishments in downtown revitalization. This year, the Main Street Center will present the award for "Best Public-Private Partnership in Downtown Revitalization" to the City of Clinton and local contractor W.F. Carr for their efforts in the Clinton City Grill project. "The Main Street awards are very competitive," says Mary Rose, the senior planner for the Clinton-Sampson County Planning Department and the City's Main Street Coordinator. She adds, "Each year the Center selects only a few winners from across the state, and there are always a lot of well-deserving projects. I think the selection



City Council Establishes Mission and Sets Goals

At the December City Council meeting, Council formally adopted a mission statement and goals to establish the City's priorities for the 2009-2010 budget year. Upon the Council's formal adoption Mayor Starling remarked, "We worked hard to find a common direction. I think we're well on our way." The mission and goals emphasize the Council's commitment to keeping Clinton beautiful and safe while continuing to improve and maintain infrastructure. Some of the goals include creating a citywide beautification program, providing opportunities for high-risk youth, creating a comprehensive water and wastewater plan, and developing a master transportation plan that includes streets and roads as well as alternatives such as bike paths and greenways. "These goals provide us with clear direction and will allow us to set priorities and allocate resources to the most significant projects," says City Manager John Connet.
