Eliza Lane CDBG Project Completed *by Jeff Vreugdenhil, Public Works & Utilities Director*

As one Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project ends, another project is set to begin. The residents of Eliza Lane, Abron Street, and Jerome Street now have city water and sewer services and paved roads thanks to the completion of the city's most recent CDBG project. The neighborhood had been experiencing failing septic tanks, and the dirt roads continued to deteriorate. "The Eliza Lane CDBG project accomplished a great deal for the neighborhood," said City Manager Shawn Purvis. "Ultimately we improved water quality with upgraded lines, public health with new sewer, fire protection with new hydrants, and accessibility with paved roads." The \$791,000 (\$573,000 grant) project was the city's fourth CDBG project in the past five years. It served 17 households in the Eliza Lane neighborhood and brought the total number of households served by the city's CDBG projects to more than 30.

With the Eliza Lane CDBG project now complete, the city will turn its attention to its next CDBG project beginning in February 2014. The new infrastructure project will include removing 2-inch galvanized water lines and replacing them with 6-inch water lines in various areas around the city. Areas that will receive upgraded lines include East Boney, Betty, Green, Maple, Phillips, West Powell, Herring, Lloyd, Grantham, Ellen, Graham, and Kennedy Streets and Walston Lane. The project will include installing new fire hydrants to increase the level of fire protection along these streets. The project will take six months to complete.

Clinton Police Hold First Latino Forum *by Brittany Locklear, PD Sr. Administrative Specialist*

In September, the Clinton Police Department held its first public forum for the Latino community. More than 80 people attended the forum hosted at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church on Lisbon Street. The intent of the meeting was to help build communication and understanding between the Latino community and the city, particularly law enforcement. "The Latino Community Meeting was an excellent forum for law enforcement to learn about challenges that our Latino citizens face. It provided insight into how we should direct police services," stated Police Chief Jay Tilley. By helping the Latino community understand how the Police Department operates, the Department hopes to build trust and eliminate any confusion or perceived bias. The forum provided an opportunity for members of the Latino community to ask questions, address concerns, and provide feedback to help the Police Department have a better understanding of challenges they face. One attendee showed his appreciation for the meeting stating, "Thanks for having this meeting; we appreciate the police trying to help with the problems faced by Latinos." The City expects the forum to be the first of a series of meetings with the Latino community. "We had a great turnout and discussion at our first meeting," stated City Manager Shawn Purvis. "Our goal is to have several more. We only covered three law enforcement topics at this meeting. There are more public safety concerns to discuss, including fire, and the Latino community also has lots of questions about our other services like planning and water and sewer." The city hopes to coordinate a second meeting in the spring.

If you need to stop by the Clinton Public Works Department anytime soon, you can find them in their temporary offices. On January 2, renovations began on the existing Public Works building. During the six-month renovation, Public Works offices, including Cemetery, Streets, Sanitation, and Utility Lines, will be located across the street in the old Caison Building located at 215 Ferrell Street. Residents and vendors can enter the offices directly across the street from the Sampson Independent building. The renovation will not affect or alter any services. In fact, the city has added a new service. In the city's continued effort to provide exceptional services and care for our environment, Clinton Public Works recently began a program to collect used vegetable oil for recycling. Residents can drop off any used cooking oil that does not contain food particles and is in liquid form at Public Works offices in a sealed container clearly labeled vegetable oil.
